

SACE Completion







To make this wonderful SACE completing result a reality, the students of 2019 attempted 224 subjects of which 223 attempts equated to a successful completion grade. The below table showcases the grade distribution.

2019 also saw us increasing the opportunities for students to obtain their SACE, using flexible options. In 2019, 13 students completed one or more VET units of competency, contributing towards a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship. This is a huge increase when compared to 5 students in 2018.





Student progress at Naracoorte High School is constantly assessed against the Australian or SACE Curriculum. Assessment is related to each child's ability and specific areas that have been covered in teaching. Reporting against the established criteria, or performance standards, identifies areas of concern and enables strategies to be put in place to help students improve.

Reporting involves communication between the teacher, the student and the parent about progress, strengths and areas for improvement.

In 2020 Naracoorte High School will move toward increasing the number of Parent Teacher Student Conferences and removing teacher comments on reports. This process will allow us to build a strong partnership between parents and teachers in order to help each student reach their full potential. We will be providing four formal grade reporting cycles and four interim (mid-term) reporting cycles.

Report Type:

Progress Reports (Grade) End of Term 1 and 3 Semester Reports (Grade) End of Term 2 and 4 Interim Reports (Stoplight) Mid-Term 1, 2, 3 and 4

Each Progress and Semester reporting cycle will include Parent/Teacher/Student Conferences to enable a conversation about the student's learning and progress.

- The friends and family who could not make the travels to the Adelaide shows, but none the less were there in our hearts. Your support over the last year has kept us all going.


The amazing messages sent from around Australia, scrawled on the back of Retro Postcards shared with the cast are a sentiment to the importance of building and maintaining our story telling connection.






KNOCKOUT ER JEKET

Lions Youth of the Year 2020

On Monday 17th February, five Year 12 students competed in the Naracoorte leg of the Lions Youth of the Year Quest. Ashlea O'Shaughnessy, Cleoni Trussell, Jamin Ireland, Jamie Sincock and Olivia Neagle had been preparing for the competition for many weeks, prepping their speech topics, practising impromptu presentations, as well as brushing up on their general knowledge. On top of this, all competitors had to submit a detailed application form, displaying their academic achievements, as well as skills in leadership, citizenship and sports over the past two years.



On the day of the speeches, each student had a 45-minute interview with the judging panel, where they were asked a range of questions to verify their applications and test their general knowledge.

In the evening members of the Lions Club, the judges, students, families and NHS staff gathered at Billy Macs to hear the students speak. The students were given two impromptu speech topics which tested their speaking skills and their ability to think on the run. The topics were around whether they thought technology was having a positive or negative impact and whether they believed climate change was real. It was clear that the students drew on a range of knowledge from subjects they study and information they have read previously to form their answers.

They then went on to present their 5-minute prepared speech. Each student presented a very different topic and made efforts to persuade the audience to their point of view. The importance of encouraging young people to take on Agricultural pathways was made clear by Cleoni. Olivia spoke about the



importance of removing the stigma associated with men's mental health in rural communities. Ashlea encouraged the audience to ditch their passports and explore the beauty that Australia has to offer. Jasmin highlighted the importance of education for all, making a strong link to how lucky we are in Naracoorte to have the amount of access we do. Making connections and the importance of listening to elders in our lives was the focus of Jamie's speech and she drew on personal experience to drive her point home.

It was a very close competition as each student had clearly put their points forward in a passionate and persuasive way. Ross Gleeson of the Lions Club stated that the students were exceptional and that if these students are leaders in the future then we are in good hands.

Congratulations must go to all the students, with a special congratulations to Olivia Neagle who won the prepared speeches and was named the overall winner of the Naracoorte section of the Lions Youth of the Year Quest.

The School received some wonderful feedback from the night about our students which we would like to share:-

"Cleoni made me so proud to work in agriculture, sharing some very important roles that are available to all walks of life and educating people of the vital importance agriculture has in our future. Ashley made me want to 'put away my passport' and see the wonders in my own backyard, which is so topical right now given the affects the bushfires are having on our tourism industry. Jamie made me cherish the conversations I get to have every day with all generations, reminding me how lucky I am to get to do this and to not take it for granted. Jasmin struck a chord with her debate on education, motivating me and making me want to do more to provide opportunities to all. Lastly, Olivia made me want to make our government accountable to the role they need to be playing in providing funding for men's mental health in rural areas but also reminded me that it starts right here with us, today.

So thank you, to the 'class above' of girl power. I have no doubt that they all have very bright futures ahead of them!"





Dear parents

At Naracoorte High School we aim to create a safe and supportive school community for everyone.

You are an important part of our work to prevent bullying and to respond effectively if it happens. Stopping bullying involves everyone.

If your child talks to you about bullying:

 Listen calmly and get the full story. Your calm response is important to allow your child to tell you all about the situation. After they've told you their story, ask questions to get more details if you need: who, what, where, when. Although you may feel some strong emotions about your child's experience, try to keep calm to avoid more distress to your child.



- If your child talks to you about bullying:
- 1. Listen calmly and get the full story.
- 2. Reassure your child that they are not to blame.
- 3. Ask your child what they want to do about it and how you can help.
- 4. Visit www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find some strategies.
- 5. Contact the school.
- 6. Check in regularly with your child.
- Reassure your child they are not to blame. Many children blame themselves and
 this may make them feel even worse. You could say things like, 'That sounds really
 hard to deal with. No one should have to put up with that.' or 'I'm so glad you told
 me. You should be able to feel safe at school; that's not fair at all'.
- 3. Ask your child what they want to do and what they want you to do. A critical part of your response is to avoid jumping in to solve the problem. While it is natural to want to protect your child, helping them to find their own solution is a better option. It helps them feel they have some power in the situation.
- Visit <u>www.bullyingnoway.gov.au</u> to find some strategies. The website has tips and ideas for different bullying situations. One idea is to practise strategies at home to help your child feel more confident.
- 5. Contact the school. Your child may be reluctant for you to do this, so discuss the idea and reassure them that the school would want to know and is able to help. Make an appointment to meet with your child's teacher and, if you need to, ask to talk with the principal. Contact the school immediately if you have a concern about your child's safety.
- 6. **Check in regularly** with your child. Keep the conversation going. It can take time to resolve issues, so check in regularly with your child about their experiences and their feelings. Your ongoing support is important.

If you are looking for support for yourself to deal with a bullying situation, you will find ideas on the Bullying. No Way! website for parents. As well, please feel free to contact the school if you would like to discuss any aspect of our approach to preventing bullying.


