It has been wonderful seeing our Performing Arts students showcase their learning in recent weeks. I thoroughly enjoyed our Drama students' excerpts in their performance "Ghosted" which was supported back stage by a motivated group of young people from a range of year levels, who formed the back stage crew with the support of Miss Owen-Phillips. I was also delighted by the soloists who entertained us as a part of the Music concert this month and enjoyed a great night of music. 
Amongst the activity of Term 2 we have some notable achievements to acknowledge:

### **Interim Progress Reports and Achievement Reports**

Each reporting cycle comprises communication with parents and caregivers via interim progress, followed by Parent/Teacher/Student Conferences to enable a conversation about the student's learning and next steps. The cycle finishes with the Semester report.

Interim progress was communicated to Parents/Caregivers via the mid-term Stoplight reports within Sentral. This was followed by the opportunity for interviews at the request of teachers and Parents/Caregivers. Thank you to all the parents and caregivers who attended interviews last week to discuss student progress and gain feedback on the evidence of learning thus far and what our young people can do to improve against the standard of achievement.

Achievement Reports will be posted within Sentral at the end of Term 2. The report provides the final grades in each of the subjects studied in Semester 1. Please be aware that academic reports at Naracoorte High School are grade only reports. The assessment and allocation of the final grade for Year 7 – 10 is aligned to the achievement standards within the Australian Curriculum with Stage 1 and 2 subjects aligned to the Performance Standards and requirements of the SACE Board.

### **Communications**

Our Home Group teachers have an important role as a part of our school community in supporting students' wellbeing for learning. Home Group teachers are the first port of call for any inquiries relating to the learning, engagement and wellbeing for our young people. Email is the most convenient way to contact teachers as they are often committed to teaching our young people throughout the school day. All staff email addresses are on Skoolbag, along with the contact for specific home groups. If you have any difficulty accessing this information please contact the school by phoning 8762 1333.

Please be aware that email communications will be responded to in a timely manner when teachers are not committed in the classroom, however, this may not occur on the same day of receiving an inquiry.

Any queries relating to teaching and learning that are unable to be addressed by the Home Group teacher can be directed to either our Middle School Coordinator, Mrs Felicity Slotegraaf or our Assistant Principal Flexible Delivery, Pathways and Senior School, Ms Tammy Schinckel.

### **Staffing Updates**

Mrs Jeanette Terry and Ms Lisa Riley will be on leave in Term 3 and 4 with Mrs Nadine Di Giorgio also taking leave in Term 3. We wish them all a lovely break during their respective periods of leave.

Mr Kieron Hicks will continue in the role of Senior Leader Strategic Operations for Term 3. We are in the process of finalising our staffing for the remainder of the school year.

Our amazing team of educators continue to ensure our young people are effectively supported in the face of the continued challenge of not having enough teachers to look after our students on a day to day basis.

I can not express how grateful I am to the team of educators at Naracoorte High School who put our children at the forefront every day. It is wonderful to be part of team of staff who support each other to ensure our students are provided with continuity in their learning.

### **COVID-19**

We continue to navigate the impact of living with COVID-19. As you are aware the mask wearing mandate in secondary schools ended on Monday 30th May. Whilst masks are no longer compulsory, teachers and students may continue to wear masks at their own discretion. Should the School be deemed to have an outbreak, mask wearing will return for a period of two weeks. Parents will be notified if this occurs.

As the cold and flu season is now upon us, it is important that we all continue to follow SA Health expectations if we are unwell.

Thank you to our families for following SA Health advice, particularly in keeping their children at home when they are symptomatic. Please continue to be vigilant in monitoring for symptoms in your child. If your child develops symptoms such as a fever, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, runny nose, loss of smell/taste, muscle/joint pains, diarrhea, nausea/vomiting or extreme tiredness please do not send your child to school. Students should remain at home until you receive confirmation of a negative test and their symptoms have resolved, whichever is longer.

Please continue to inform us if your child tests positive for COVID-19. If your child tests positive they must remain isolated for 7 days and follow SA Health instructions.

In line with current advice, we continue to provide a single notification to families at the end of the day that lists the year levels affected by COVID-19 cases that day.

### **Student Free Day**

Please be aware that the last day of Term 2, Friday 8th July has been approved as a Student Free Day for the purpose of professional development for educators focussed on Differentiation. Teachers will be working with Student Support Services to expand the repertoire of strategies that are effective in engaging and supporting the range of learning abilities within the classroom.



# AG UPDATE

The Year 11/12 Ag students from Naracoorte High combined with Bordertown and Commandook High School for a three day careers tour around the upper and lower South East.

Day 1 saw the students travel to Tintinara for a visit to Southern Cross Feedlot, Zadow's Honey Farm, Yanven Kelpies and Alpha Group Monitoring. The students learnt how to feedlot cattle and the various markets available, how honey is produced and extracted, the essential skills for training kelpies as working dogs and how to use technology to improve water monitoring on farm.

Day 2 included a visit to Humpalicious, Sky Seafood and Mike's Beef Jerky. Humpalicious is a camel dairy which currently milks 10 cows and is hoping to build up their breeding herd. Students were able to taste the camel milk and also experience camel icecream. Students then travelled to Sky Seafood to learn about a Seafood Wholesaler and how their products are graded and exported to China. Mike's Beef Jerky was a highlight for the students, with free samples of the most delicious jerky ever. It was really interesting to learn how a hobby, turned into a large business that is continuing to expand.

Day 3 we headed south to Clark's Robotic Dairy and the United Dairy Company. The robotic dairy included six robots for milking, with room to add two more in the future. The students learnt how technology can play a major role in improving the dairy industry through automation and robotics. At UDC, students had a tour of the facilities and followed the production line from the raw milk product to the powdered product, followed by a barbeque to finish off the final day.



## DRAMA NEWS



# SCIENCE INCURSION

## A CASE OF CONSPIRACY – YEAR 7 – 10 SCIENCE INCURSION



Look out! A new drug dealer on the scene is found dead and foul play is suspected. An 18-year-old boy is arrested for the murder which he claims to know nothing about. However, drugs, a gun and a stash of money were found at the home of the accused which all point to his guilt!

Luckily our Year 7 – 10 students are on the case. Our students examined evidence and interpreted the evidence which included arson, DNA and ballistic evidence.

This was a hands-on activity that allowed our students to explore how different aspects of Science work together to find solutions to not only solve crimes but in day-to-day life. Students also explored how serious social and community issues can impact others' perceptions while raising drug awareness and the impacts of hanging out with the wrong crowd.



# AG CAREER EXPO

On Wednesday the 18th May, approximately 100 secondary students with a passion for Agriculture and Agriculture and Pathway teachers came together at Naracoorte High School for a hands on interactive Ag Career Expo. The CSI: Crop Science Investigators program, that was held at the High School, aimed to engage students in how research and innovative technology are being used to solve global problems such as an emerging food crisis. Students from Naracoorte High School, Allendale Area School, Bordertown High School, Grant High School, Kangaroo Inn Area School and Penola High School participated in the program, which included the field day, followed by an in-school competition where students must use creative thinking to invent a solution to help increase sustainable food production. The field day/Expo featured key topics such as plant breeding and genetics, precision agriculture, agricultural engineering and machinery innovation, virtual reality and disease monitoring. 
The efforts and performance by all students involved saw us finish in 3rd place as a school.

# HOSTED INDUSTRY TOURS

The Year 10 students have continued to explore opportunities throughout the term with a focus on Hosted Industry Tours. These have been held each Monday where students have had the opportunity to visit a range of local industries to find out firsthand the array of jobs that are available within these industries. Our first tour was to Mini Jumbuk, where students had the opportunity to tour Mini Jumbuk and heard about the huge range of jobs and career paths that people have undertaken to join this company. Students learnt about the occupations that they could pursue for a gap year, a full-time employment opportunity straight from school as well as all of the occupations and career pathways of people that have studied University degrees and are now employed by this company. Students learnt about manufacturing and exporting, marketing, packaging, dispatch, graphic design and retail to name a few options. Thanks to Olly for openly sharing his diverse pathway of employment and the skills that he picked up along the journey that have assisted him in the management role he has today.



The second Hosted Industry Tour took students to the new Naracoorte Library and then out to Teys Naracoorte. The students heard from employees of local Government. Paul McRostie who spoke about planning and compliance as well as his background and related career pathway of starting off as a builder. Jayne Miller then spoke to the students about the Council structure and engagement as well as the connections to community. This was followed by Karl Manarangi speaking about all the hands-on jobs that are undertaken by a Council and how he manages a team of people. Students then headed out to Teys where not only were they given a tour of the plant but were told about the many pathways and Careers that are available in this industry. Students also learnt about the environmental focus of the plant and the work that has been done in this area.

Three amazing places and industries that we are so grateful for their involvement in our Pathways program. Enabling our Year 10 students an opportunity to discover a wide range of careers and pathways ranging from entry level to University degree requirements. We are grateful for their input into our curriculum giving our Year 10 students a broad range of information and experiences to be able to make informed decisions about relevant individualised Pathways in the future.

# PATHWAYS UNI VISITS



On June the 2nd we welcomed representatives from Adelaide University, Flinders University and the University of South Australia. Our Year 10 students worked through a Career Match task. They had previously undertaken a quiz and have a Career Match individualised report that was discussed with opportunities and possibilities at University linked to their personal skills, interests and current pathway thinking. They also learnt about the difference between different degrees and terminology that is used. The ATAR (Australian Tertiary Entrance Ranking) was explained and representatives answered students' questions and explained how to access and explore University Career Pathways.



On the same day the Year 11 students did an intensive session around the Research Project. Exploring ideas and thoughts as many of the students start their thinking ready to tackle the Research Project next Semester. For those that have already started, it gave them the opportunity to gain deeper thinking around their topics as they tackle the final stages of the subject.



Year 12 students participated in an informative session about the huge range of options with University courses on offer. They had the opportunity to ask clarifying questions and seek information from the University experts about the huge array of courses available, the scholarships on offer to support them and Uni life in general. ## Lunchtime Fun




## The History of Naracoorte
