#### From the Principal ...

Again we reach that time of year where we say goodbye to our Year 12 students. They have worked hard and we wish them all the best for their future endeavours.

They have been inspirational leaders of the school during our global pandemic and I take my hat off to them for not allowing what's happening around us to be a distraction. They embraced this new unfamiliar normal whilst successfully completing their SACE. Well done!

We are working hard to prepare for Year 7 to High School in 2022. Term 4 has seen the start of a new teaching sprint (teacher talk for professional development) involving teachers of Years 6 to 9 from across the whole Wrattonbully Partnership. The teaching sprint will focus on literacy across the curriculum, with the intent to improve teachers' expertise to develop students ability to read subject-specific academic texts. It will also ensure teacher practices are consistent across this crucial transition period.

We have begun the transition process for the Year 7 students going into Year 8 in 2021. We have now completed our visits to all the local primary schools, and have conducted their orientation visits to Naracoorte High School. All the primary schools will be visiting us on their full Transitions Days on Tuesday 17th November and the 1st December. On this day, Year 7 students will come to the High School for the whole day and will have set lessons in a variety of subjects. Thank you to all the staff from both the Primary Schools and Naracoorte High School for all their hard work in making these days a wonderful experience.

Recently four of our students, Ashlea, Chloe, Ella and Lucy have been awarded The Duke of Edinburgh's Silver Award. Brooke, Zach, Brayden, Bich, Max, Ella and Mykaela received their Bronze Award. A big thumbs up to Bich, Max, Ella and Mykaela who also received an Honourable mention. This is an outstanding achievement as this internationally recognised award is all about sustaining an ongoing commitment in activities that reflect a student's interests and passions. The Duke of Edinburgh's Awards can also be used to obtain SACE credits through Community Learning. 

The girls started the day strong, against Mount Gambier High School (MGHS) with a quick, 6-0 win by Rosie and Brooke. Kiele and Ella also played well to win their doubles, 6-4. Strong performances were the trend of the day, with Amelia and Rosie going on to win both their singles 6-0. Kiele and Ella followed suit winning their singles 6-2 and 6-3 respectively. Next up was Tenison Woods College (TWC). Kiele and Ella had to fight hard to secure their doubles win in a tiebreaker. Unfortunately, TWC were just too strong, controlling the play to take three wins, 6-0. Kiele and Brooke tried their best to hold on in their singles, securing three and two games, respectively. TWC would go onto win the Girls competition. The final round saw the girls compete against St. Martin's Lutheran College (SMLC). Kiele and Ella continued their winning form in doubles to secure a 6-1 win. Amelia and Rosie also won their doubles in a tiebreak. From there confidence returned quickly with Kiele and Brooke winning singles 6-0 and 6-2. Amelia continued the winning form defeating her opponent in a tiebreaker. 
