Year 12 Chemistry Excursion

As a part of the Year 12 Chemistry curriculum, students are required to complete a Science as a Human Endeavour (SHE) task. This task focuses on the development of Science as a way of knowing and doing and explores the purpose, use and influence of Science in society. To support the student's research, the Year 12 Chemistry class visited the Transmutation Station in Robe. There, students focused on how certain plastics are made, their uses and how they can be recycled.

One of the most challenging plastic to recycle is polystyrene (the foam in your packages or your bread tags) due to its

chemical composition. Brad and Narelle Scott from Transmutation explained their process in collecting polystyrene and how they recycle it into useful materials such as bowls, serving platters, doorknobs and pens.

The excursion was eye-opening and informative for the students and has raised awareness about recycling. Naracoorte High School is a collection point for your recycled bread tags.

Did you know Naracoorte High School is an Aussie Bread Tags for Wheelchairs collection point?

Bread tags for Wheelchairs started in South Africa in 2006 with the idea to recycle bread tags plastic to raise funds to buy wheelchairs. In late 2018 the idea took hold in Australia and has grown rapidly.

Bread tags in Australian are recycled at Transmutation in Robe, a craft plastic recycling operation who take monthly shipments of bread tags and recycle them into bowls, boards, coasters and even door knobs!

Facts:

- Wheelchair tally: 28
- Recycle tally: 4,429 kg of Aussie bread tags recycled to date
 - Current recycling rate: 250kg of bread tags / month

Your bread tags can be collected for recycling at the collection point in the Wellbeing



Currently the social media app 'Tellonym' is gaining traction.

Being an 'anonymous question and answer' feedback app, it is not simply the app itself that is dangerous but the behaviour of those using it that determines the safety and positive or negative experiences of other users.





- The app by design is a good idea but the issue highlights to the right is about the users. The app can offer positive interaction and feedback.
- Users can offer their question, privately to just their close friends by sharing it just to them. This can be a good way to control who sees it.
- There are reviews by it's users that they've found incredibly positive experiences and feel part of a community within the app, the age ranges of these users varies but is often young adults or older teens.
- Because the app can be completely anonymous it presents several challenges, including controlling behaviours that are harmful within the app.
- Users post something "anonymously" and then post it on Social Media somewhere, making it much easier for the commenter or viewer to work out the poster's identity.
- There is moderation, but the issue here is the users can't be banned who leave horrible comments, as most of the time they don't have an account to ban, therefore it's a constant issue that never gets fixed.
