## A study in Naracoorte History

In Year 11 History, we have been learning about the local history of Naracoorte. Over the last two weeks we have visited three different sites: the Naracoorte Cemetery, followed by Struan House and then the Sheep's Back Museum.

We visited the cemetery on October 27th, focusing on the front section where the oldest graves are found. We discovered that headstones contain valuable information, and were surprised by the amount of family graves with young children who died within the same year. We also found the graves of notable local figures: William MacIntosh, founder of Kincraig (the original town of Naracoorte), William Robinson, from Struan, and WT Gore, the builder of Struan House.



The following week we visited Struan House, where we got a more in depth look of the founding family. We were given a tour by Justine Drew, who informed us of the house's rich history, such as William Robinson, the founder of Struan House, who recruited W.T. Gore to design the house. We were particularly interested in the stories: the



tiled floor with purposeful mistakes, the original furniture that was left because it was too big to get out the door, and what really did happen to Frances? (Was she pushed or did she fall?)

Most recently we visited the Sheep's Back Museum where Mrs. Judy Murdoch gave us a tour of the museum and showed us the archives. We looked at some of the old ball gowns and photographs, and how to preserve them. This taught us that we should try and preserve artefacts and history, which is something Naracoorte is only just starting to see.




## **CONGRATULATIONS**

I was the winner of the SA Sheep Expo 2021 Merino SA Scholarship which gave me a week on-farm experience with a Merino Stud of choice. I was lucky enough to spend the week on Old Ashrose Merino Stud with the Wadlow family. During that week, I was involved in shearing and crutching and got the opportunity to help select rams for clients.

On Day 1, I spent the morning helping with penning up mobs for shearing. I also got to visit the AI Centre where I learnt about collecting and freezing semen, and then thawing and checking the quality of samples. Later in the day, I got a full farm tour of Collinsville, looking at the ewes and checking out the new flash ram shed and sheep yards. I really enjoyed learning about the importance of the structure of the sheep to ensure longevity and how the sheep have the ability to do well on hill country with nature pastures.

Day 2 and 3 was back helping move sheep and bringing in mobs for shearing, as well as classing rams for sale. These are shorn prior to sale in the northern pastoral country. A lesson I learnt, was the importance of wool nourishment, meaning the wool will be better yielding. I



was also helping on the race backlining and vaccinating. We moved mobs from the Ram Sale shed up to the main



shed. I even got to be part of selecting fleeces for the show. This involved selecting the rams and ewes from the Ram Shed, and then transporting them up to the shed to get shorn. These fleeces then get entered into Royal Shows around Australia.

Day 4, I was fortunate enough to jump on the handpiece and help out with the crutching. In the afternoon we were back busy shifting and sorting mobs. We had to select some rams for delivery the next day. We loaded these up early and headed off.

This scholarship helped me learn more about the different types of sheep run in the different pastoral areas. I learnt more about the style of sheep in the mid north, they are bigger framed and heavier cutting, with a medium type of wool. I also learnt more about the breeding of merinos and poll merinos and how the genetics influence the horns.


## **CONGRATULATIONS**
