# From the Principal ...

Dear Families

This term we are enjoying the increasing ability to engage our students in a range of experiences that value add to the high-quality learning opportunities our teachers have provided throughout Term 1. With the reduced restrictions, students are increasingly engaging in learning beyond our school grounds and through the involvement of guest speakers returning face-to-face within our school. Today we hosted a STEM investigation project in the CSI: Field Day. Students with an interest in the Agricultural Industry explored soil health, agronomy, AgTech, plant breeding, agricultural engineering, quality grain, germination and biosecurity through a series of presentations. Following this our students will conduct an in-school research investigation.

#### STAFFING

This term we welcome Mr Kieron Hicks to the role of Senior Leader Strategic Operations for Term 2. This has seen some classes change their teachers for Term 2.

Undoubtedly the most significant challenge we have faced this year is having enough teachers to look after our students on a day to day basis. Thank you to our amazing team of educators who continue to ensure our classes are effectively supported. It is wonderful to be part of a team of staff who support each other to ensure our students are provided with continuity in their learning.

#### FAREWELL

At the end of Term 1 we farewelled our Groundsman, Gordon Gibbs. Gordon has made a significant contribution to our school over the past 5 years and the grounds are looking amazing thanks to his wonderful efforts. We will definitely miss his presence on site and we wish him all the very best in his future endeavours.

#### COVID-19

We continue to experience the challenges of COVID-19 and the impact of ongoing positive cases emerging amongst staff and students.

Leading into Term 2, the Government advised that mask wearing is mandatory for the first four weeks of Term 2. When indoors, face masks will continue to be required for students, staff and visitors to our school. Your continued support with re-enforcing this expectation with your child is much appreciated.

If your child develops symptoms such as a fever, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, runny nose, loss of smell/ taste, muscle/joint pains, diarrhoea, nausea/vomiting or extreme tiredness please keep your child at home until you receive confirmation of a negative test and their symptoms have resolved, whichever is longer, and inform Student Services if your child tests positive.

The changes to close contact regulations will hopefully ease pressure on the school as staff and students no longer have to isolate if they are a close contact. They do, however, need to follow SA Health directions which includes undertaking five RATs over seven days after exposure and staying at home if they have symptoms.

# After School Support

On Wednesday, 11th May, we had two students from our school travel to Mount

Gambier to participate in the South East Heats of the 2022 Rostrum Voice of Youth Public Speaking Competition. The competition was held at Grant High School. Other schools that competed this year were St Martin's Lutheran College, Grant High School and Mount Gambier High School. The schools in the South East appreciate the ongoing support and sponsorship of the Mount Gambier and District Community Bank for the South East Heat, as without this support the students from the South East would need to travel to Adelaide for the Heats.

The competition sees the students present a prepared speech (from a choice of five topics) of six minutes for juniors and eight minutes for seniors and a short notice speech, where students are given 15 minutes to prepare a three minute speech (from a choice of three topics).

#### In the junior heat, Year 8 student Maggie

McLean competed against three other students. Maggie chose the topic "Start a conversation" for her prepared speech and then selected "It was perfect" for her short notice speech. Maggie used emphasis and varying tones in her voice to highlight her arguments.

In the senior heat, Year 12 student Charlie Wakefield competed against four other students. Charlie chose the topic "Changing the narrative" for her prepared speech and "We can't change it" for her short notice speech. Charlie's prepared speech was well researched and she delivered a thoughtful message in her short notice speech.

While Maggie and Charlie were not selected to progress to the Semi-Finals in Adelaide, they both represented our school wonderfully and should be proud of their efforts.

Our Graphic Novel section consists of 153 books from which 132 loans were made. The most popular book from that section was Vampire Knight 1, borrowed by 4 different students.


Our new Year7 year group were our top readers for Term 1 borrowing 373 books between them. Well done Year 7's.

# YR 10 PATHUAYS

A busy start to the term for Year 10 Pathways.

Students have spent Week 2 presenting their Industry Problem activities to their peers, as well as Mrs Erika Vickery OAM – Mayor of Naracoorte, Mr Trevor Smart – CEO Naracoorte Lucindale Council and Mrs Ann Sears – retired Business owner. The students have worked on solving Industry related problems throughout the latter part of Term 1 and have created prototypes and presentations outlying their competitors, their point of difference, their budget projections and what the problem is they are trying to solve, to name a few things.

Some of the Industry problems that the students have created solutions to,



have been: Entertainment options for Naracoorte, a café targeted at young families, a café targeted for those with disabilities, a bakery with extended opening hours, a safer silage machine to safely dispose of silage wrap, a public transport proposal for Naracoorte, an extension tool to replace the old step ladder, welding gloves that are thick enough to protect, but thin enough to actually hold onto a project with ease, particularly for smaller hands, and even an invention to inspire young children into the construction industry.

Later in the term students are attending Hosted Industry Tours to investigate more potential Career Pathways. Thanks to Mini Jumbuk who host us in Week 5, Teys Naracoorte and the Naracoorte



Lucindale Council who host us in Week 6, the Naracoorte Caves that host us in Week 8, Schinckel Engineering and Naracoorte Automotive that host us in Week 9 and the Struan Research Centre that host us in Week 10.

On top of this, interested students are attending the Agricultural Career Expo and Field Day to be held at Naracoorte High School on May 18th. On this day students will rotate through six different stations to explore machinery, innovation and agricultural engineering, precision agriculture, plant breeding and genetics, soil health, crop agronomy and monitoring weather for improved input applications.


SECOND TERM DATES - Tuesday 17th May - 5th July THIRD TERM DATES - Tuesday 2nd August - 13th September
