Work Experience

Naracoorte High School Rocks!

Understanding how our Earth was formed and its geological features can help us create a sustainable future. Staff from Naracoorte High School have been working with TESEP and Australian Rare Earths to gain further insight into how critical minerals will be used in a sustainable future. Due to a series of training and development, teachers are now using their new learnings to inform their content aligned with the Australian Curriculum.

In addition to this, Australian Rare Earths have provided an opportunity for one of our senior school students to undertake some work experience. Read on to find out about their experience...

During the School holidays, I undertook some work experience at Australian Rare Earths. I chose to do work experience there after visiting the Naracoorte workshop with my Chemistry class. I found critical minerals interesting and learnt how important critical minerals are for our future. Some of the jobs I did while undertaking my work experience included working in the workshop to test samples using the XRF machine and pegging for future drills. I also visited the trial pit at Koppamurra.

During my time at Australia Rare Earths, I learnt how to identify a "good" and "bad" sample by reading the data from the XRF machine. I could then use that data and put it in a database. I also learnt how to drill works and what workers on the rig do. I really enjoyed working with a wide range of people and learning from them.

This experience opened my eyes about what I plan to do for my career pathway. I was exposed to a range of professions that I would like to pursue now and once I have finished school.

I'd like to thank Jacqui Owen and Rick Pobjoy for hosting me and Tammy, Andrea, Miss Edwards and Mrs Corletto for supporting me.

Year 7 Excursion to the Naracoorte Caves!

In Term 3, all of the Year 7s went to the Naracoorte Caves. We went caving with a guide. The first thing we did was to collect our safety gear, that included a helmet and a headtorch. After this we went into one of two Caves, the Stick Tomato and the Blackberry Cave.

Blackberry Cave – The Blackberry Cave was very twisty, and you needed to crawl in lots of places. There were many small gaps, and we needed to climb up and down the crevices. There was also a challenge called the Letter box challenge.



Stick Tomato – This cave had lots of challenges to do, including the Keyhole and the eye, where you needed to twist your head, body and limbs to fit through the small space.

Another activity we did whilst on the excursion were the team games. One of the tasks was the donut eating challenge, where we had to eat a donut off a piece of string without using our hands. We also had a skittle relay, where we worked in teams to move 10 skittles from one plate to another, across the field, using only a straw. Three were also some mini challenges including football accuracy and a three legged race.

We were also able to visit the Victoria Fossil Cave. In here a guide gave us information about how animal bones ended up in the caves by falling down wells, and the work archaeologists do in the caves We also learnt it is really important to not touch the walls and surfaces, to preserve the caves for future generations.


Naracoorte High School Grievance Procedure

The Naracoorte High School Grievance Procedure is intended to be used in accordance with existing policies and Codes of Conduct.

Individuals are encouraged to attempt to resolve their concerns directly with the people involved, as early as possible and where appropriate. This means:

- having direct conversations
- being open to hearing the perspective of any other people involved
- making reasonable adjustments to behaviours to support a positive and professional relationship.

Individuals may choose to engage a support person as needed. Whereby personal resolution is not effective or is not an option for reasons of individual sensitivity, power imbalance or the nature or seriousness of the complaint the affected party may put their concerns in writing to the line manager of the person they're complaining about or the principal.
