During the recent school holidays, The Year 12 Integrated Learning class headed to Cambodia as part of their subject

Departing Naracoorte High School on the last day of term, the group made their way to Adelaide in preparation for an early flight to Singapore Saturday morning. Arriving in Singapore Saturday afternoon the group undertook a City tour of Singapore before settling in at the Transit hotel in the Airport. On the Sunday it was another early start

as we departed Singapore for Siem Reap – Cambodia.

Sunday was welcome day and the group checked into their accommodation for the week before a swim in the pool and a beautiful lunch. Students made their last calls home before they handed over their mobile phones to be locked away for the week, with the idea of disconnecting to reconnect and be present in the moment and experiences that lay ahead. After lunch the group headed out on a walking tour of Siem Reap where they visited a Buddhist monastery, and had a fish pedicure or foot massage and exploration of the riverbank and old marketplace.

Monday's theme was Grounding and Intention setting, where students started on Task 6 of their Year 12 Integrated learning subject. This is a task about Tribe, a self-development program where students get to explore themselves and the unique gifts they can bring to the world. They participated in a Khmer language and cultural awareness session before a tour of Siem Reap district by Tuk Tuks, stopping at many local market stalls and trying many different food delicacies







along the way. Monday evening the group were treated to a dinner at Apsara Theatre which included a meal and cultural show.

Tuesday's theme was Honour the Journey – Exploring the secrets of Cambodia's past. The group were up at 4.30am to make their away to Ankgor Wat in anticipation of a beautiful sunrise. This did not eventuate, but students enjoyed a comprehensive tour of the Temple by a wonderful guide who incidentally also provided a tour to the Clintons and Obamas previously. After the disappointment of no sunrise it was back to the accommodation for breakfast before heading out again to explor Bayon Temple, Neak Pean and Preah Khan Temple.

Wednesday we headed to Treak Community Centre. With a theme of Giving Back, the group assisted students and staff at Treak with English lessons, listening to students read, and undertaking craft activities. During break time, the students played football and basketball with the students. At lunchtime the group got to meet Brak Sopanna, a famous Cambodian musician who recently performed at the opening ceremony of the Para games. After lunch the group headed to Vuthy's in laws were they started work on Task 5 for integrated learning. This was a group task where the students had to work in groups to produce a number of cakes to be sold at the local markets in the morning. With the language barrier and recipes only partly translated this proved a challenging but enjoyable task for the students, pushing them outside their comfort zones. We also had traditional tea with the family that included the opportunity to try frogs, crickets and silk worms. A late night of cooking and dancing before we made our way back to our accommodation for a good night's sleep.

Thursday's theme was Community Awareness – Exploring the Cultural Riches of Cambodian Lifestyle traditions

- students were up early and eager to meet up with the family that they cooked cakes with again. After breakfast we headed out to the local markets. With hundreds of stalls side by side and motorbikes zipping around everyone this is a very different experience. Combine this with no one (except us) speaking English, and you are setting up for an interesting morning. But our amazing students took it all in their stride. The second part to Task 5 was to sell baskets of the cakes they had prepared the night before to market goers and stall holders. Students worked in their groups to



sell the cakes, having to speak Khmer and manage foreign currency. A great learning experience that took them well outside their comfort zone. After selling over 400 pieces of cake, and donating the money back to the family,



we set off on our next adventure, lunch at Footprints. Footprints is a social enterprise café where they employ local people and provide training and sustainable practices. Following lunch the group headed out to the floating village of Kompong, Khleang stopping at sticky rice village on the way. At the village built on stilts, we heard about life as a fishing family, and some of the trials and tribulations faced by these families. After vising a local house, and village, we did a boat tour around the largest lake in South East Asia – Tonle Sap – the great lake, before hearing the story of Tevy and then going to Tevy's for tea.

Friday's theme - Unfolding the Truth - Uncovering Cambodia's



hidden past: A tour of hidden war sites. We started the day with Tribe and setting intentions before heading off to Apopo. Apopo is a place that is used to train scent detection animals nicknamed HeroRATS in the hope of ridding the world of landmines, returning safe land back to communities for development. Following the tour and demonstration where everyone got to cuddle a HeroRAT – Jenny, we headed to Wat Thmei – The killing fields. We heard stories of Cambodians recent tumultuous Cambodian history. After lunch at Tevy's again, we headed to the War Museum where Moun Sinath shared his story of losing his whole family to the war and his wife 6 years ago from stepping on a land



mine. Despite walking with a prosthetic leg and a body full of shrapnel, Moun considers himself a lucky man. After a debrief and freshen up, it was off to the Phare Circus. The Phare artists are students and graduates from Phare Ponleu Selpak's vocational training centre in Battambang. The association was formed in 1994 by 9 young men coming home from a refugee camp after the Khmer Rouge regime. They were greatly helped during that time by an art teacher using drawing classes as therapy and wanted to share this new skill among the poor, socially deprived and troubled youngsters in Battambang. They founded an art school and public school followed to offer free education. A music school and theatre school were next and finally, for the kids who wanted more, the circus school. Today more than 1,200 pupils attend the public school daily and 500 attend the alternative schools. Phare Ponleu Selpak also has extensive outreach programs, trying to help with the problems highlighted in their own tales. Phare the Cambodian Circus offers these students and graduates somewhere to hone their skills and a place to earn a decent wage. Money that will take them out of poverty and give them self-respect and freedom.

Saturday's theme – Gratitude the Journey – After breakfast the group caught the trusty Tuk Tuks to the Lotus farm where they participated in a special Tribe session with a focus on reflection and inspiration. Students reflected on what they were grateful for and people who had inspired them, and who they have inspired. Onto lunch at the Muffin Man another social enterprise café in Siem Reap and then back to our Cambodian family's house for a sewing lesson. Students worked in groups to produce three different shirts that are made and sold at the markets, gaining a greater understanding of some of the jobs that people do in Cambodia.











Sunday's theme – Refresh for the final phase – An extended Tribe for Task 6 was held where students wrote gratitude letters and shared their learnings of the past week. They received a Monk blessing for safe travel and happiness before a final lunch at Tevy's. Students then explored the markets, collected a few souvenirs and gifts for loved ones before heading back to our accommodation for a swim and a good night's sleep before we started our journey back home. The heavens opened and a true monsoonal downpour was experienced by all.

Monday's theme- Farewell Day – Up early for breakfast and check out before many hugs and tears as everyone farewelled our Cambodian friends. A flight back to Singapore and a 7 hour layover gave plenty of time to explore Singapore airport before catching a flight back to Adelaide at 11.30pm to arrive in Adelaide at 8.30 in the morning and a four hour bus trip home.

Students then spent Friday back at school (last day of the holidays) working on their assignments for this Year 12 Integrated Learning subject, before settling back into normal school routine on the Monday, where they started the term with a presentation to the students and staff at the High School.

CO2 Dragsters in Year 9 Design & Tech!

Students have been investigating for the properties of materials which can be combined with force, motion and energy to create engineered solutions.

Students are given a set of constraints and challenged to design and produce dragsters that are either compliant or non-compliant to race in either category for looks and speed.

Racetrack is 20m long and dragsters run off a single CO2 cannister, fired from our custom launcher.

Flexible Industry Pathways

Throughout 2023 a number of students have undertaken a variety of Flexible Industry Pathway subjects

A FIP contains three parts, Contextualized SACE, Industry immersions and a Certificate Course.

All students completed 20 SACE stage 1 credits in Workplace Learning throughout the year, as the contextualized SACE component of their FIP. They have participated in either work placement or Pathways to a Pay Packet or both as part of their Industry immersion, and then they have been working on a specific Certificate Course related to their industry of choice.

This free workshop is aimed at parents/caregivers with a child living with a disability in Years 9 to 12.




