### Outdoor Ed Camp



#### Stage 1 Outdoor Ed students enjoy trip to Kangaroo Island!

Firstly we have to thank Four Reasons Why for contributing to this camp, we appreciate this support and had the experience of a lifetime.

**Day 1:** The entire class was very committed and arrived at school at 5.45am. We drove most of the day to the ferry and then to Karatta. We set up camp, cooked our first meals, and gathered in the dining room to discuss the itinerary for Day 2.


Day 2: We started at the Vivonne Jetty rocky outcrop and explored the flora and fauna present. Aussie spotted many crabs in the rock pools and we were all wowed at the strength of the ocean hitting the rocks. Next was Raptor Domain; there was two sessions to attend, first was the Birds of Prey talk where everyone got to hold a bird or have it run across their laps. We learnt a lot about how to conserve native bird species, including a demonstration from a magpie on how to use a bin! After lunch there was Reptile Presentation, we saw native scorpions (don't worry they are only as venomous as a bee), a bird-catching spider, lizards and snakes. We saw the infamous inland taipan and a tiger snake, and got to hold a range of pythons and lizards. We finished the day exploring Vivonne Bay beach.

Day 3: Another early start as we had to be on the other side of the island by 8.30am, we prepared for our exciting ocean safari. Initially we were concerned that we wouldn't get to see dolphins at all so we started with the seals and reef exploration. Fun Fact: The Kangaroo Island coastline has a larger species diversity than the Great Barrier Reef! The seals were happy to jump into the ocean to check us out and entertain us with their antics. After getting back on the boat, the boys were so happy to have hot water to warm their hands/feet and to pour down their wetsuits. The boat headed out in search of dolphins, and we were very excited to find them. The boys were towed behind the boat until they were close and then the dolphins swam next to and underneath them. They warmed up again and returned to land. We then headed down to Sandboard at Little Sahara, there were many thrills and spills to be had! Finally, we headed for Flinders Chase National Park and toured Admirals Arch and Remarkable Rocks.

**Day 4:** After raining most of the night we packed up our wet tents and jumped on the bus for the long trip home!

### Try a Trade Week



#### The ultimate trade experience at NHS

During week 5 of this term, a group of Year 10 students had the opportunity to participate in a weeklong intensive trade workshop.

Students applied for the opportunity, and all 15 that applied were accepted into this fully funded week of training held right here at Naracoorte High School.

Thanks to the generosity of CITB (Construction Industry Training Board) students completed their White Card on the Monday. A white card (or general construction induction card) is required for workers who want to carry out construction work. People who need a white card include site managers, supervisors, surveyors, labourers, and tradespeople.

On the Tuesday they tried their hands at Bricklaying – each student created their own structure learning the techniques and knowledge involved if they wanted to pursue a career in this field in the future. Wednesday was tiling day where students had to measure, cut and apply tiles to make a specific pattern and explore the basics of this career pathway.

Thursday was all about Plumbing where students learnt how to join pipes and create plumbing systems before testing for water proofing.

Friday concluded with Carpentry where students measured, cut and constructed their sample tasks. Thanks to TAFE SA for providing the staff to deliver the training for our students so they can make more informed decisions in the future about their career pathways.

Students became clearer as the week went on as to whether a trade was something they wanted to pursue in the future, and if so what area they may find out further information about.
