2026 Staffing Announcements

We are pleased to share our staffing updates for the 2026 school year, which reflect both continuity and renewal across our teaching and leadership teams.

Hillary Trotter has won and accepted the 3-year Senior Leadership position – Teaching Practice and School Systems. Hillary brings extensive experience from Renmark High School, Penola High School, and her previous time at Naracoorte High School. We warmly welcome Hillary back and look forward to the expertise she will bring in 2026 and beyond.

Felicity Slotegraaf returns to Naracoorte High School after a successful year as Principal at Naracoorte South Primary School. Flic will step into one of our three Senior Leader roles, overseeing Curriculum Innovation and Learning Design.

Staff not directly involved in the Year 7 induction or Year 12 retreat will participate in professional learning focused on quality teaching, engaging pedagogical design, and effective system operations.

Supervision will be available for vulnerable or at-risk students and those requiring care on Days 1 and 2.

School Device Purchase Program (SDPP)

Governing Council has endorsed a staged implementation of a School Device Purchase Program beginning in 2026.

Rollout Plan:

2026:

- Year 10s encouraged to purchase via the Department's device portal
- Years 11–12 continue with school-supplied devices

2027:

- Year 10s required to purchase via the portal
- Year 12s may continue with existing devices
- Year 11s using school devices from 2026 may continue

2028:

- Year 10s and 11s operate under the SDPP
- Year 12s may continue on school devices


2029:

A Leadership Model with Greater Connection and Purpose

Fridays (Session 4, Weeks 2, 5, 8)

Combined leadership meetings involving House Leaders, Executive House Leaders, School Captains, and the Principal. These sessions will provide clear direction, strengthen collaboration, and ensure our student leaders are active contributors to school improvement.

Mondays (Weeks 3, 6, 9)

House Assemblies will follow the leaders' meetings, enabling consistent communication and a shared sense of purpose across all Houses.

The Student Leadership Body, comprised of School Captains and House Leaders, creates a streamlined and highly connected leadership group. This structure is designed to promote strong student voice, visible leadership, and aligned priorities across the school.

Leadership development for Years 7–9 students will continue through our Futures programs, coordinated by the Middle School Leader.

We congratulate all students on their appointments and look forward to supporting them as they lead their peers and contribute to the direction of the school in 2026.

Materials & Services



2026 Materials and Service Poll Results

Section 129 of the Education and Children's Services Act 2019 allows schools, in consultation with the governing council, to charge, collect and recover a materials and services charge.

For the 2026 school year, the governing council has approved a proposed materials and services charge amount of \$520.00.

As the materials and services charge is greater than the legislated prescribed amount(s), as referenced in the Education and Children's Services Act, the governing council is required to undertake a poll to gain majority support from the school community for this proposed charge to be compulsory, and therefore recoverable in full.


The prescribed amount as per the Education and Children's Services Regulation (Regulation 81) is \$306 for a primary student and \$403 for a secondary student.

The governing council therefore seeks your support for the proposed 2026 materials and services charge of \$520.00 to be compulsory.

The results of the poll indicate:

Yes – 149 No – 53

Therefore the \$520 Materials and Services charge will be compulsory for 2026.



Pathways Camp



Year 10 Pathways Careers Camp – A Week of Discovery and Inspiration!

Our Year 10 students recently returned from an action-packed Careers Camp—five days filled with hands-on experiences, industry insights, and a glimpse into the incredible opportunities awaiting them beyond school. Here's a look back at their exciting week:

Day 1 – University Pathways in the Heart of the City

The week kicked off in Adelaide's CBD with visits to the University of Adelaide and UniSA city campuses. Students explored campus life and learned about a wide range of career pathways, including commerce, finance, law, robotics, engineering, the arts, astrophysics, space exploration, and geology. It was an inspiring introduction to the study options available after high school.

Day 2 – Innovation, Trades & Health

Students led the way, navigating public transport to the Tonsley Innovation Hub. Here they discovered careers in technology and STEM and attended a career-skills presentation.

A guided tour of Tonsley TAFE showcased trade pathways such as construction, carpentry, cabinetmaking, plumbing, electrical, refrigeration, sign writing, bricklaying, plastering, and tiling.

Flinders University staff then introduced students to health careers including optometry, paediatrics, nursing, midwifery, and paramedicine.

The day concluded with a behind-the-scenes tour of Adelaide Oval, where highlights included the media centre, historic scoreboard, change rooms and the museum.

Day 3 – Animals, Emergency Services & the Arts

At the Adelaide Zoo, students explored careers in zoology, veterinary science, and animal care.


A visit to the Metropolitan Fire Service demonstrated the vital role of emergency services and pathways into the field.

At City TAFE, students were exposed to courses in hair, beauty, cosmetics, floristry, fashion and allied health—before enjoying lunch at the iconic Central Market.

The afternoon included visits to the Art Gallery, SA Museum, and State Library.

The day wrapped up at the brand-new SASI facility, where students explored careers in elite sport, sports science, physiotherapy, exercise physiology, and peak performance. They were even lucky enough to meet Olympic hopefuls Olly and Solly, who are training toward Brisbane 2032.

Day 4 – Trades, Hospitality & High-Tech Exploration

A bus trip to Regency TAFE opened students' eyes to automotive careers including light and heavy vehicle mechanics, auto electrical, outboard mechanics and electric vehicle technology. They even got to try VR welding—technology used to train apprentices working on ASC and BAE naval projects.

Students also learned about hospitality careers such as chef training, butchering, baking, winemaking, craft brewing, and cheesemaking, followed by a delicious lunch at Tiros, the graduate-run restaurant.

The day finished at UniSA Mawson Lakes with an exploration of STEM fields including design and technology, aviation, engineering, and space exploration.

That evening, students tested their teamwork and problem-solving skills at the Adventure Rooms!


Day 5 – Parliament House & Farewell


After the tour, the group began the journey home—tired but inspired—following what was truly a jam-packed, rewarding week.

A huge thank you to all staff and students for making the Year 10 Careers Camp such a memorable experience. We can't wait to see where these pathways lead!







Will Maney scored one of our only goals for the day, which we're counting as a super shot! With only one practice game before we left for the Mount, the boys
